ANSWER OF L. DUCREST TO THE SUIT
OF LARRIEU ST. MEZARD.

Petitioner L. Ducrest, states that on the 14th., February Sieur Larrieu St. Mezard had notified him of a bill of parcel for 962 livres, belonging to one Catalot of Bordeaux (Fr.) with his proxy and the effects had been delivered to the late Bonnemaïson, and the 27th., of February, had me summoned before you to be sentenced to pay the said sum.

When the inventory was taken of the effects, I did not find any invoice or papers concerning this stock. I cannot therefore produce or recognise any account, only by your order.

May it please your honor that in case I should be sentenced to pay the 962#, that the said Larrieu be held to accept an order on the treasury, or he prefers, a letter of exchange on France, that I will give him in one year at one months site, paying him interest from that day, having sold money under the same condition where the heirs of the late Bonnemaïson have interest seeing the difficulty of being able to sell for cash.

RE: SUCCESSION OF MONTANARY, SHOE-MAKER.

Seals having been previously affixed by Mr. Delaunay, Councillor, Commissioner herein appointed, on all the effects belonging to the Community heretofore existing between the late Montanary, shoe-maker, and his wife, M arguerite Talon, he now repairs to the domicile of said deceased, together with the Substitute for the Attorney General and the Clerk of the Council for the purpose of removing said seals and to proceed with taking of the inventory of said effects and make an appraisal of same, which appraisal is to be made by Mr. Joseph Maison, Sheriff, who is also now present as well as the widow of said deceased, Mr. Monget Latime, undertutor, Pierre Portal and Mr. Caille, guardian of the seals.

It being verified that all of said seals were unbroken, these were removed and inventory was taken and appraisal made of all effects.

Inventory shows that said effects consisted of household furnishings, a silver watch; wearing apparel and of things belonging to the trade of deceased, such as shoe forms, various hides, a quantity of tallow, also a quantity of salt. Certain papers and documents, among which was found one relating to the lot on which the domicile

is situated. Mrs. Montanary declared there were one or two debts due by deceased. Total value of all property inventoried is not shown. All property was left in care of the widow of said deceased on conclusion of inventory and appraisal.

All parties present signed with the exception of the widow, who declared she did not know how.

Jean Baptiste Garic, who has been ordered by his Doctor to go to France, declares he is indebted to Sr. Bokaline for 5950 livres and according to a Court order of July 11, 1767, he was to pay this in piastres and Letters of Exchange. His creditor at first, through his agent and attorney-in-fact Sr. L'humeau, refused to accept it in this form of payment. Later he offered to liquidate the debt in indigo and/or pelts. This also was refused.

Now, Messrs. Livaudais (father and son) are obligating themselves jointly to buy the indigo during August at 3 livres 15 sols per pound, and with the proceeds, pay the debt of Garic.

Plaintiffs allege further that service of the writ of provisional seizure was not completed, because attendants declared they knew of no property belonging to Viat; and that consequently plaintiffs sought relief through execution of the decree of arbitrators hereinabove referred to, which condemned defendant to pay 973 livres in silver and pelts up to the value of 20,483 livres 10 sols.

Plaintiffs having learned that defendant is now in jail, pray that his name be inscribed on the register thereof and that recommendations issue to keep him imprisoned until he shall have paid the foregoing sums and pelts. (Plaintiffs volunteer to pay for his food while he is in jail).

Appellant represents that the sentence of arbitration (under which he was imprisoned) was rendered by Sieurs Louis Ranson, Poupet and Perrault on an erroneous interpretation, without knowledge of the case and without legal authority. He prays for annulment of said sentence; release from prison; damages, interest and costs in proportion to the indignity of his imprisonment; and an additional indemnity for breach of contract.

Appellant shows that Fournier and St. Pe, with other merchants of this city, had undertaken to trade in Illinois and had entrusted him with the management of their business at said Post; that two years previous to the date of this appeal appellees (in breach of their contract) obtained an order from Sieur Aubry, directing appellant to resign his position, which order he obeyed;

(cont'd)

that for the purpose of protecting himself from further injustice he took steps to safeguard his own interest in the objects under his charge; that on his return to New Orleans he rendered an accounting to Fournier and St. Pe, which was accepted and the matter was thereby closed.

Appellant represents further that in the subsequent absence of appellant, without his knowledge and on the basis of a letter written by him to Nouveau (and misrepresented) and a certificate obtained from said Nouveau (former clerk of appellant and harassed debtor of appellees) Fournier and St. Pe (appellees) obtained against appellant a decision of arbitrators, who passed judgment only on those phases of the matter which appeared derogatory to appellant and ignored those in his favor.

Appellant cites authorities sustaining his defense on the following points:

His unjust imprisonment.

The nullity of the appointment of arbitrators by reason of absence and lack of consent of appellant.

The uselessness of arbitrators in a matter already settled and the questionable validity of a certificate obtained as the price of a remittance of debt.

Parity of reasons which would have justified appellant's working for his own account, because of the breach of contract by appellees.

False statement made to judge to the effect that if appellant were not imprisoned he would flee "as heretofore", when as a matter of fact appellant had not run away, but had gone to Pensacola with the signed permission of Sr. Aubry and the help of appellees themselves.

Appellant represents further that a decision of arbitrators is executory only when it is based on a valid compromise, which was impossible when appellant was at a distance of 500 leagues from the place of judgment; that appellees were precluded even from seeking the appointment of arbitrators by the fact that the account had been closed, ratified and accepted; that the arbitrators rendered a decision contrary to law, and based on false representations and that (having been homologated) said judgment tends to deprive appellant of his property and what is more, of his honor.

Appellant represents further that proof of fraud would be required in order to refute an acceptance of account, as it constitutes a tacit agreement, which according to Ferriere, has the binding force of a contract; that if plaintiffs and appellees had not feared the light of truth they would not have relied on the statement of a former clerk of appellant (Nouveau) who was being hounded by them for debt (and thereby obtained discharge thereof) to obtain their sentence of arbitration; that they would have pursued Sr. Datcherut, who gave

the receipt evidencing possession of the things enumerated therein and that they would have repudiated said receipt as false, instead of which, when Sr. Datcherut visited New Orleans after settlement of the account, they did further business with him and when he referred to the excitement over the matter, he was told not to mention it, as it was Petit who was at fault.

Appellant further represents that even though Nouveau's statement were true, his testimony would not be admissible, for the reason that he is not a disinterested party; that moreover the testimony of one witness would not be sufficient.

Appearing at the Registry of the Superior Council, Augustin Baptiste, a free negro residing on the Gabriel Plantation at English Turn, makes the following affidavit: that desiring to go down to Mr. Gabriel's from Felix's place, he found the negro Antoine, property of Mr. Villars, who was going down that way in a pirogue; that said Antoine agreed to give him passage; that he entrusted his package which contained some wearing apparel and several miscellaneous articles to Antoine while he returned for something else and that upon his immediate return, said Antoine had disappeared together with affiant's package and that he has heard nothing concerning said Antoine nor his package. Affiant declares himself unable to sign.
