Rene Boyer, inhabitant, states that having formed a partnership with the late Sr. de Clairfontaine, they were granted, as shown in petition and ordinance of June 3, 1724, twelve arpents of ground on the Mississippi River above and adjoining property of Widow Carriere (now wife of Sr. Tixerant). Shortly thereafter they jointly acquired two negroes, one of whom was short-lived and the other deserted and has been unheard of for 2 years, consequently, they derived no benefits therefrom; however, petitioner has improved his land to the best of his ability; moreover, two negroes belonging to the deceased have left on the vessel "La Dianne" to whom he has become obligated. The attorney for vacant estates wishes to lodge a claim against said two negroes, which procedure would totally incapacitate petitioner and place him in default with the Company.

NICHOLAS BION AND HIS CREDITORS.

Pursuant to the request of Mr. De La Chaise, attorney for the King and His Majesty's Counselor-in-chief in the Colony, the creditors of Nicholas Bion, heretofore employed by the Company of the Indies, are this day assembled.

Mr. De La Chaise represents the insolvency of Mr. Bion, who is unable to meet his obligations in whole or in part, and recommends the granting of permission for his return to France, thereby creating a possibility for future payment, through the assistance of his family and employment which he may secure.

Mr. De La Chaise, furthermore, represents that the amounts due creditors are small, and whereas the Company, to whom Bion owes a far greater sum, is inclined to show leniency, he is convinced that the creditors will do likewise; whereupon said creditors, with the exception of Sieur Duval representing Mr. Pereault, unanimously agree to Bion's return to France.

Consequently, Bion intervenes, extends thanks, and voluntarily obligates himself to pay said creditors during the next year (1730), pledging as security a mortgage on personal effects of present and future ownership.

Receipt of letter entrusted to Mr. Dutiné is acknowledged; although mutual friendship and esteem is apparent through correspondence, the writer deplores their separation as "a glass in hand is a great boon to friendship".

Two casks of brandy have been received, one in fair condition, the other one a third empty. The first was sold upon arrival, for 40 hams to be delivered next Winter, the latter contained only 14½ jugs, which will be disposed of to best advantage. If flour were acceptable an immediate sale could be effected. The best commodities for exchange in pelts are powder, vermilion, Limburger cheese, cutlery and large pieces of brassware. Brandy is plentiful, therefore, undesirable as a medium of exchange.

Should the proceeds of his beaver pelts permit, Mr. de Ternan wishes pots and pans, but Mr. Rossard is to first satisfy any obligations due himself.

Complaint is made regarding one worthless "Tiné" who refused to accept a quart of vinegar from Mr. De La Chaise, for delivery to Mr. Deliette and writer; this fellow is unbearable, fear is expressed that he may be placed in command, however, his reign would be of short duration, for he is given only 3

months, or until the Fall, to live, (what a loss for his spouse)!

Mention is made of Mr. Beaubois' departure for France, also of the fact that he is, probably, unregretted by the Missionaries, as he accepted their pensions below, and sent them nothing in return, writer believes they were instrumental in his recall.

Mr. de Ternan states that two quarts of the brandy, which he has salvaged from his boat, shipwrecked at "Ouabache", have been sent to Mr. Duval; also that he is due one-half of the profits of 200 lbs. of Beaver pelts and 1500 lbs. of flour, which amounts he requests Mr. Rossard to collect.

Petitioner alleges that a partnership formerly existed, in Mobile, between Joseph Graff and Pierre Louis Labiche; that on April 3, 1729 said Labiche received several knife wounds, and died forty days later; that investigation led to the arrest, trial and conviction of said Graff; who on July 19, 1729 was condemned to death by hanging and strangulation; that on May 3, 1729 said Labiche made a "sort of will" bequeathing all of his property in the Colony to said Graff; that said will is absolutely invalid, as it is but natural that the lawful heirs of said Labiche should be his beneficiaries.

Wherefore, petitioner prays that said will be annulled, and that an order issue for the customary sale of all effects belonging to the succession of said Labiche, for the benefit of whom it may concern.
